

Alumni Spotlight

Abigail Hammond (WHS '19)

We're thrilled to catch up with our talented high school alumni, Abby Hammond, who has just graduated from the Manhattan School of Music and is now making her dreams come true in the heart of New York City. We are so thankful that Abby was so generous to take some time out of her busy schedule to answer some questions.



Can you share some highlights or achievements from your time in college, such as notable performances or projects you were involved in?

I feel very grateful to have had a lot of really cool performance experiences throughout my time at school; I've had the opportunity to lead a couple school productions, my favorite being "She loves Me" where I played Amalia Balash my senior year. I've also had some good experiences workshopping and developing new musicals with industry professionals, as well as performing a handful of concerts at venues such as Carnegie Hall, Birdland Jazz, and 54 Below.

What advice do you have for current high school students who aspire to pursue a theater arts degree in college?

My advice for anyone planning to pursue a degree in Theater would be to seek out additional experiences outside of your school environment; by this I mean classes, lessons, choirs, other theatrical productions, dance classes, etc. I say this because, while I loved the work I was able to do at WHS, those extra opportunities that I sought out provided more experiences for me to learn and grow. It's really important that you dedicate your time to learning and growing your skills as an artist and expose yourself to all types of experiences. The application process that you will go through will be quite different and more time consuming than that of your peers, but if this is something that you really want to pursue then it will be totally worth it in the end!

What were some of the most valuable lessons or skills you learned during your college theater program?

I learned a lot from my time at the Manhattan School of Music; it feels almost impossible to write everything down. I'd say that the most important thing that I learned is how to start my journey of becoming a professional. What I mean by this is I learned how to conduct myself in a professional manner inside audition rooms, rehearsal rooms, during performances, etc. This also translates to the expectations that people will have of me as a professional; how to practice in an effective way, learn material quickly, how to elevate it, what it means to be prepared, and how to work with the cast and creative team around you to tell a story.

What are some of the challenges you've faced in pursuing a career in theater, and how have you overcome them?

It's interesting to talk about challenges, because in a way I feel like I am in the most challenging phase of my career, because I am fresh out of school and in a lot of ways still trying to break into the industry. I would say specifically these challenges are mainly based around how competitive everything is. For every job (both Broadway, Regional, Summer, off-Broadway, concert gigs, etc.) There are an insane amount of people who show up, I mean hundreds, and for the really big project sometimes thousands (especially if the first audition is virtual.) You must have a really thick skin and not take rejection personally, because the unfortunate reality is that essentially for every one "yes", there are at least 10-20 "no's." Naturally, this creates a lot of room for comparison. The best way that I've found to deal with this is constantly reminding myself to "stay in my own lane," and that nobody has my sets of abilities or will do the material exactly like I will. I've

had to try and develop lots of confidence over the years, and learn that ultimately rejection is not personal, even if it feels as such. Another way I cope with these feelings and issues is to go and submit/audition for everything I possibly can; statistically speaking, the more you put yourself out there, the closer you get to that "yes."

Is there anything else you'd like to share with the high school community or any message you'd like to convey to your alma mater?

WHS is a really great place, where it really allows you to explore all of your interests under the guidance of some truly wonderful teachers. Enjoy your time there and take advantage of everything they have to offer!

SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year, the Westborough Fine Arts Education Association proudly awards scholarships to deserving Westborough High School seniors.



Participation in the Arts Scholarship:

This scholarship is awarded to individuals who have dedicated themselves to participating in courses and activities within the Fine Arts Department for all 4 years of their high school career and earned at least an A average in any fine arts classes.



Passion for the Arts Scholarship:

This scholarship is offered to any Westborough High School student who plans on pursuing post-secondary studies in the Fine Arts. The student must have a declared Fine Arts major. The scholarship is awarded to individuals who have dedicated themselves to participating in courses and activities within the Fine Arts Department for all 4 years of their high school career and earned at least an A average in any fine arts classes.



Eligibility:

Qualified seniors who have participated in the Westborough Fine Arts Department throughout their four years at Westborough High School and whose parents/guardians have been a member in good standing of WFAEA for for two (2) of the last four (4) years.*

*Class of 2024 families are excluded from the membership requirement.

Rules:

Any application submitted for the Passion for the Arts Scholarship will automatically ALSO be eligible for the Participation Scholarship. All applications will be reviewed by Fine Arts Faculty and scholarships will be awarded at Graduation.

Deadline to apply is noon EST on May 2, 2024.

Upon their arrival, our students had the privilege of engaging in an interactive interview with the exceptionally gifted composer, Iman Habibi, who hails from Iran and Canada. His latest composition, which had previously debuted at Tanglewood last summer, and set to take the stage at the Boston Symphony Hall.

However, the most extraordinary moment of the musical field trip came when the legendary Yo-Yo Ma graced the stage, performing Shostakovich's 1st and 2nd Cello Concertos. Yo-Yo Ma's performance was so profound and inspirational that it left a lasting impression on the students.

WFAEA's Impact: Funding Grants, Clinicians, and Community Projects

Empowering Our Fine Arts Department: WFAEA Funding in Action

Parents and Community Sponsorship Fuel the Arts, Enriching Education

Exciting news from WFAEA: We are pleased to announce that WFAEA has granted funding of \$1,300, for the purchase of 18 new Manhasset music stands and 1 music stand cart at Gibbons. This grant supported unanimously by WFAEA members, directly benefits the 150 band and orchestra students at Gibbons and future musicians.

Gibbons' music programs have been flourishing, and participation numbers are on the rise. In response to Band Director Craig Robbins' request, this funding addresses the urgent need for additional music stands. The shortage was affecting rehearsals and performances, making it essential to provide the necessary resources to our talented students.

The decision to fund this project was discussed at the WFAEA meeting held on September 12, 2023. We are pleased to report that the vote was unanimous, reflecting the commitment of the association to support the arts



Westhorough and education at Gibbons. The grant's impact is not limited to the present; it will serve as a foundation for generations of musicians to come.

Craig Robbins is the new band director for Sarah W. Gibbons Middle School. He is primarily directing the 8th grade band and is teaching sectionals for the 7th grade band. Before coming to Gibbons, Craig taught grades 5-12 in the Harvard Public Schools. Additionally, he also has experience teaching individual private lessons, as well as music camps.

As a passionate teacher and musician, Craig is very excited and grateful to be able to teach bands in the Westborough Public School system and to share his love for music, especially jazz. He loves to recommend many musicians for his students to listen to in order to expand their love for music, and educate his students on the history of music, especially the intricate history of Jazz music. His middle school band teacher was a very influential figure for him, and his inspiration led him to choose this path for his career. He really hopes to inspire his students in the same way. He loves to share his enthusiasm for music in many ways. One recent example was creating Band sweatshirts and t-shirts. Before teaching, Craig earned his undergraduate degree from Berklee College of Music, and earned his Masters Degree in music education from Gordon College.

As a Band director at Gibbons Middle School, Craig hopes to push his students to become the best musicians they can be. He focuses on giving students a diverse sampling of music to help them get better at reading unfamiliar music. He is very passionate about playing music his students enjoy and hear in their day to day lives, and to make learning music and playing in a band as enjoyable as possible.

NEW FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

A Home With Heart At Hastings

Join us in welcoming Amy Crossin as a full time Art Teacher at Hastings Elementary this year! We had a chance to chat about the year ahead, her first big project, and her new home at Hastings. If the name sounds familiar it's because she spent last year teaching at Mill Pond as well as being a regular fixture in the local arts community. You can't help but warm to her in an instant and at the end of the conversation I knew I had made a friend.



She got her start teaching elementary art here in Westborough at Mill Pond School. A lifelong artist and creator, she has been the summer camp Art Director for Grafton Recreation, taught art at Fitzgerald Community School in Northborough, and founded The Parading Palette where she teaches private individual and group art lessons.

The position at Hastings Elementary was the perfect opportunity to commit to full-time art teaching where she started with a big collaborative project to kick off the year. Working with an often repeated motto, "Hastings has heart" as her guide, she created a range of ways for all students to contribute to the final piece; younger students with markers, older students with paint exploring warm to cool colors. The result was the beautiful co-creation pictured here – the perfect analogy for what Amy says she loves most about teaching in Westborough: being part of a larger community all working toward the same goal. "Having come from Mill Pond, I know what's coming down the road and I can help add to the great continuum of their arts education."

"There are no mistakes in art" and "they get to get messy here" are some of the best phrases to hear from an art educator as a parent – Amy's passion about art and teaching were contagious during our conversation and will surely be felt by her students. "I love getting to know the kids. I love their enthusiasm, and being able to create a time in their day where they don't have to have the right answer, just what's in their heart. I want this class to be a small sparkle in their lives."

Like most artists, it's not a vocation, it's a lifestyle, and she still spends time outside the class creating (watercolors are her first love!), contributing to the art community here in Westborough through Art Share* and exhibiting at the school shows. Sitting down to talk about her new role and arts education here in Westborough left me inspired and proud of the culture and investment into arts education we have here in town. We're so excited that Amy is here and can't wait to see more from her and her students in the coming year.

*Don't know what Art Share is? We didn't either! Amy explained that all the art teacher in Westborough get together once a month to show what they are working on, get feedback, encourage each other and trade tips-isn't that the coolest? I had no idea and now I just want to know if parents can join too!

NEW FACULTY SPOTLIGHT



Jessica Conrad English and Journalism Teacher, Co-Advisor for The Lobby Observer at Westborough High School

We're so excited to chat with you, can you tell us where you got your start?

I went to the University of New Hampshire for both undergrad and grad school. I have a Bachelor's of Arts in English and History and a Master's of Education in Secondary Education.

What do you love most about teaching in Westborough so far?

I love how tight-knit the community seems to be. Working with students on the school newspaper and with Westborough TV has allowed me to really get to know the community and to be aware of important values and traditions of the town.

I really love the students! Already, my students and I have created solid connections that help me teach them best. Something I noticed right off the bat was how polite students at WHS are. At the end of class, nearly every one of my students thanks me on their way out. This was definitely new to me!

What made you become a teacher – and what drew you to English and journalism?

I went to college undecided and didn't declare either of my majors until my sophomore year. I realized that my interests really centered around learning how and why people communicate in the ways that they do, which led me to study English and history. I love getting to know people and helping others in whatever ways I can, so I thought teaching would be a good fit for me. I enjoy being creative and the challenge of finding fun, engaging, and innovative ways to present information to students is one I proudly take on.

Were you part of your school's newspaper/publications when you were in school?

Sadly, my high school did not have a school newspaper.

What is your philosophy about teaching journalism?

I consider awareness (global, national, and local) and compassion to be the most important components of journalism. We spend a lot of time, in the journalism courses that I teach, discussing the ethics of journalism and the mindset that a good journalist has. I encourage my students to be curious about what is going on in the world around them and to pursue their interests through writing and broadcasting.

What do you think about journalism moving into the Fine Arts Department?

Especially with broadcast journalism, there is definitely an artistic element to it. There is a lot of room for creativity, especially when it comes to script-writing for the news anchors, filming, and editing, so I think the courses are well-suited in the Fine Arts Department. There is still a lot of writing involved, but I think it's great to have some curricular overlap between English and Fine Arts.

Are there potential ways you'd like to grow the student publications?

Yes! I'm definitely eager to increase our viewership, especially through the *Lobby Observer*'s social media pages. This year, the Advanced Journalism students have started working on a biweekly newsreel to be shown in period 1 classes every other Monday, which we also hope will increase student interest in what the *Lobby O* does. We have a lot of really talented students, so I'm constantly looking for new ways to get their work the attention it deserves!


